

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT



As we faced the second year of a pandemic that exasperated need and disrupted food supply chains across the country, MEANS Database worked to expand our partnerships to reach more people and support more food system players. Our goal has been to both deepen our work within existing networks and expand further into new regions during this crisis.

In my six months as Executive Director, after six years of working with MEANS, I have never been so excited about the organization and the opportunities for more food recovery. Our team is small but smart, adaptive, and creative, and I am looking forward to working with the team to continue to grow.

Partnerships with state extension agents, farmers, the EPA, warehouses, and other food recovery organizations have made 2021 a year of substantial growth. Grubhub continued to support our Community Meal Program, and we deepened our connections in Rhode Island, Florida, Pennsylvania, and California, furthering our food recovery efforts.

2022 is set to be an even better year. We're excited to soon offer a downloadable app to our users and expand our work in Iowa. We're collaborating with more mutual aid organizations since clarifying the Emerson Act with Harvard's Food Policy and Law Clinic. With these opportunities and more on the horizon, we're looking forward to continued progress to waste less, and feed more.

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW


At MEANS, we strive to be as transparent as possible with our financial donations and expenses. We are extremely grateful to all our financial supporters who believe in our mission to assist nonprofits serving those facing food insecurity through food recovery and the Community Meal Program.

Below is a breakdown of our expenses for 2021. Our Community Meal program continues to be our highest expense, with over \$2.87 million going directly to locally owned businesses in our eight key cities. This year we began offering transportation in specific regions to allow nonprofits to claim donations regardless of their ability to pick them up. We continue to work with our website development team, Cohere, to improve our website for all users.

FOOD RECOVERY AT A GLANCE

This year, MEANS moved 126,748 pounds of recovered food throughout the country. This would not have been possible without our incredible network of organizations and businesses that continue to donate their excess food and spread the word about MEANS Database.

As of this year, we have users in every state and the District of Columbia. We have developed strong networks in specific places like Florida (pg. 5), Rhode Island (pg. 7), and in the cities where we run our Community Meal Program (pg.6).

We received funding from Simply Organic/Frontier Co-op to do outreach to organic food producers, which led to incredible connections in California and Massachusetts. Every donation we receive is crucial to continuing our mission to waste less and feed more. Some of our most memorable donations this year have been 7,000 pounds of olive oil in Oakland, 28,000 pounds of prosciutto and salami in Iowa, and 6,070 pounds of Summer Food Service Program meals in Philadelphia.

We are looking forward to doing more food recovery in the next year and continuing our reoccurring programs like the Summer Food Service Recovery Program in Philadelphia and Rhode to End Hunger in Rhode Island!

FLORIDA


We increased our work in Florida at the beginning of 2021 after Jeannie Necessary with University of Florida- IFAS Extension Family Nutrition Program reached out to us.

This year, we've had the opportunity to collaborate with amazing partners such as UF-IFAS FNP, Florida Impact to End Hunger, St. Matthew's House, and so many more. We've made great strides towards establishing food recovery efforts in Florida and cannot wait to see how we will further expand our work in 2022!


COMMUNITY MEAL PROGRAM

At the start of 2021, MEANS drastically increased our capacity to provide purchased meals from restaurants for local nonprofits serving individuals facing food insecurity.

This program cultivates incredible relationships with both restaurants and nonprofits alike. These businesses and organizations have both felt the strain the pandemic has caused and have come together to serve the community. In one example, Sid Sahni, co-owner of Full Skoop, stays with volunteers at East Bay Food Not Bombs to pass out meals.

This program has been a blessing to so many and we are looking forward to continuing in some capacity in the upcoming year.

RHODE ISLAND

In October, we received an EPA Healthy Communities Grant in partnership with Rescuing Leftover Cuisine (RLC) and the Rhode Island Department of Health (RIDOH) to expand food recovery across the state and provide biodegradable food packaging for donations. We are thrilled by this opportunity to work with RLC to offer transportation for all donations across the state, and continue to build upon our Rhode to End Hunger partnership with RIDOH from 2017!

We also joined the Rhode Island Food Policy Council in 2021, which has allowed us to partner with dozens of new organizations and initiatives across the state. Looking forward to continued progress in the coming year!


